# Stream Exclusion Fencing Changes, Buffer Payments and the Chesapeake Bay Watershed Plan III

The Culpeper Soil and Water Conservation District is scheduled to receive historically high levels of cost share funding from the Commonwealth for implementing agriculture conservation practices (BMPs) in the District; available funds are nearly tripling to \$4.3 million. Why? Two reasons. One, the Culpeper District has been identified as one of eight districts in the Bay watershed area of Virginia that contribute nearly seventy percent of the nitrogen pollution entering the Bay from agriculture. Two, the Commonwealth is funding the state ag cost share program at record levels: about 2.5 times as much. The Commonwealth is seeking to accelerate the adoption of practices using the voluntary program approach. These two decisions have put a very significant amount of money into the Culpeper District for projects. Our job: get the practices on the ground.

The recently released draft Chesapeake Bay Watershed Implementation Plan III (<a href="https://www.deq.virginia.gov/Programs/Water/ChesapeakeBay/ChesapeakeBay/TMDL/">https://www.deq.virginia.gov/Programs/Water/ChesapeakeBay/ChesapeakeBay/TMDL/</a>

<u>PhaseIIIWatershedImplementationPlanning.aspx</u>) calls for record levels of all BMPs across all sectors: ag, urban and residential. Stream livestock exclusion practices are not the only practices prescribed for major increase in implementation but these are clearly very significant here in the Culpeper District. The WIP III suggests that the Commonwealth will consider setting a date by which all perennial streams would be expected to be fenced (see page 61 of the above link). Beyond that date ... who knows. Right now, the Commonwealth is putting a lot of money on the table for the voluntary approach.

Coupled with the increase in funding and increase in state expectations comes significant changes to what the cost share program offers for stream exclusion practices. (Previously producers were eligible for 50, 80 or 85 percent reimbursement and 25 percent tax credit on their out-of-pocket costs, with no consideration for income lost due to the loss of buffer acres.) Now included are higher cost share rates, increased practice flexibility and new buffer "rent" payments to help producers reduce any losses due to buffer setbacks. The maximum amount



# DGIF REPORTS ONE CWD-POSITIVE WHITE-TAILED DEER IN CULPEPER COUNTY

Press Release from VDGIF

RICHMOND- The Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries (DGIF) has confirmed Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) in a male deer (buck) legally harvested in Culpeper County in November 2018. A cooperating taxidermist submitted the sample to DGIF in late January. At the time this deer was harvested, the hunter did not notice any outward signs of disease and the buck appeared to be in good condition. While CWD has been documented in northwest Virginia for over nine years, this deer was harvested more than 40 miles from the nearest CWD-positive deer in Frederick or Shenandoah counties. Because of the distance from other known positives, DGIF conducted an extensive forensic investigation to confirm the harvest location of this deer, resulting in a delay in releasing the information to the public.

This spring and summer, the DGIF will be working with cooperating partners and members of the CWD Response Team to determine the most appropriate measures moving forward. These measures may include regulation changes, enhanced CWD surveillance, and other methods designed to assess and manage the spread of the disease in Culpeper and surrounding counties. Additional CWD surveillance efforts will be launched in fall 2019 utilizing predominately hunter-harvested deer. In order to address questions and concerns from the community about the Department's planned management approach to CWD in this area, a public meeting will be scheduled for late summer in Culpeper County.

This past hunting season, the DGIF worked with fifty taxidermists statewide to enhance Virginia's CWD surveillance. Of the more than 1,600 samples submitted by participating taxidermists, CWD was only detected in the single Culpeper deer. The DGIF also tested over 1,550 deer harvested from Frederick, Clarke, Warren and Shenandoah counties and detected CWD in 2 deer from Shenandoah County and twenty-six deer from Frederick County. An additional doe from Shenandoah County, reported to the Department by a member of the public and showing symptoms of the disease, was diagnosed with CWD in April. DGIF staff are very appreciative for the enthusiasm and cooperation demonstrated by taxidermists and deer hunters who aided in this sampling effort.

CWD has been detected in twenty-six states and three Canadian provinces. In Virginia, a total of sixty-eight deer have tested positive since 2009. This incurable disease, found in deer, elk, and moose in North America, is a slow and progressive neurologic disease that ultimately results in death of the animal. The disease-causing agent is spread through the urine, feces, and saliva of infected animals. Noticeable symptoms, though may not appear in animals for over a year, include staggering, abnormal posture, lowered head, drooling, confusion, and marked weight loss.

There is no evidence that CWD can be transmitted naturally to humans, livestock, or pets, but the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention advise hunters to test all deer harvested from known CWD-positive areas and to not consume any animals that test positive for the disease.

available per applicant has also been increased to improve planning flexibility. Payments to producers for the buffer "rent" are for buffers 35 feet or greater and will be made upfront for the full life of the contract.

# Free Soil Tests for Lawns

Thanks to a grant from the Chesapeake Bay Restoration Fund, also known as the Bay License Plate Grant Program, Culpeper Soil and Water Conservation District is offering free routine soil tests for lawns. This program is funded by the sale of Chesapeake Bay License Plates. The goal of the lawn testing program is to better inform property owners on the use of fertilizer and other soil amendments for healthier lawn and cleaner water. Your purchase of a Bay plate would contribute towards funding similar grants across the Bay Watershed in Virginia. # Stream Exclusion Practice Maintenance Cost Share Payments Available


The Culpeper Soil and Water Conservation District is accepting applications from agriculture producers for support payments to maintain existing fences and supporting infrastructure along streams and other surface water in the District. Fences must be preexisting, must be capable of keeping livestock out of the streams and cannot be under any other contract lifespan with the District, NRCS or other entity. Successful applicants are required to continue to maintain the practices for 5 years after payment. Payments range from \$0.50 to \$1.25 per foot of stream bank excluded by fence. Maintenance payments are also available for water troughs, stream crossings and water systems; \$250, \$500 and \$1,000 respectively. # **Culpeper SWCD Launches Road and Driveway Maintenance Guide**

Over time many roads and driveways deteriorate for a variety of reasons: poor initial design or construction, poor maintenance, extreme weather or heavy traffic. In addition to costly repairs, many roads and roadside ditches drain into local streams delivering both sediment and gravel into stream channels. This is destructive to the stream, resulting in loss of stream bottom habitat and results in loss of channel capacity. Improved maintenance incorporating best management practices (BMPs) can save money and better protect local waterways.

Currently available to property owners is the Dirt and Gravel Road BMP Guide, published with funding from the Chesapeake Bay Restoration Fund. The guide can be found at the Culpeper Soil and Water Conservation District's website (<a href="www.culpeperswcd.org">www.culpeperswcd.org</a>) under publications. Hard copies can be picked up from CSWCD as well as your local extension office or building office.

# NEW REGULATIONS TO ADDRESS CHRONIC WASTING DISEASE (CWD) IN DEER


The following regulations were passed by the DGIF Board in May 2019 in response to a CWD positive deer in Culpeper:

- It is now illegal to feed deer year round within 25 miles of Culpeper. This includes: Culpeper, Fauquier, Madison, Orange, Rappahannock, Albemarle, Louisa, Spotsylvania and Stafford.
- It is now illegal to move a whole carcass out of Culpeper, Madison or Orange Counties
- Culpeper County is now in Earn a Buck regulation (Must kill a doe in order to kill second buck, second doe to kill third buck)

Hunter killed samples are the backbone of the program:

- Taxidermists and processors will be paid to submit samples
- There will be drop-off fridges in various parts of Culpeper
- There will be mandatory sampling stations on opening day of firearms

Also, if you have any wildlife issues, such as reporting sick deer or detecting feral hogs call 855-571-9003.
